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ERITREAN DELEGATION HOLDS TALKS WITH RUSSIAN FOREIGN MINISTER



Senior Eritrean delegation, composed of Foreign Minister Osman Saleh and Presidential Adviser Yemane Ghebreab, met and held talks in Sochi with Mr. Sergei Lavrov, Foreign Minister of the Russian Federation.

The two sides conducted friendly and comprehensive discussions spanning bilateral relations as well as regional and global developments.

Regarding bilateral relations, the two sides focused on concrete

measures to develop cooperation in the political, diplomatic, economic, cultural, military and technical cooperation.

Subsequent to their productive talks, the two Foreign Ministers held a joint press conference, which underscored the convergence of views between the two countries.

Foreign Minister Osman Saleh reaffirmed Eritrea's independent and principled position on the "Ukraine pretext that has sadly sacrificed Ukraine and its people for the purpose of destroying the Russian Federation; just as the Taiwan issue is being foisted as a pretext to bring to a halt China's peaceful rise by any means necessary, including violent conflict".

SEMINAR TO WAR DISABLED VETERANS IN SWEDEN

Mr. Fisehaye Tesfamichael, Chairman of the National Association of Eritrean War-disabled Veterans, conducted seminar to members in the Swedish cities of Gothenburg and Orebro.

At the seminars, Mr. Fisehaye gave detailed briefing on the history and mission of the association and achievements registered in the past 30 years as well as on the activities carried out to rehabilitate war-disabled veterans and challenges encountered.

Mr. Fisehaye also commended the financial and material support being extended to the national association by branches of the association in the diaspora.

Mr. Fisehaye went on to say that the branches of the association in various countries have contributed over 900 thousand dollars, over 11 thousand Euros, close to 33 thousand Pounds, 90 thousand Kroner and over 81 thousand Nakfa towards the implementation of the programs of the association.

SOLAR SYSTEM INSTALLATION PROTOCOL AGREEMENT

The Ministry of Finance and National Development signed a protocol of agreement on 23 March, with the African Development Bank to implement the Dekemhare 30 MW Solar Photo Voltaic project worth about 50 million Dollars.

At the signing ceremony carried out at the Ministry of Finance and National Development office, Dr. Giorgis Teklemichael, Minister of Finance and National Development, and Dr. Abdul Kamara, Deputy Director of the African Development Bank signed the protocol agreement.

Speaking at the occasion, Dr. Giorgis said that the energy project is an important step towards realizing Eritrea's plan to increase



access to electricity and enhance socio-economic development of all Eritreans.

Dr. Giorgis further noted that the Government of Eritrea is working on installing power plants generating 360 MW and that the protocol agreement aligned with the other ongoing projects will have significant input in the future rapid, inclusive, sustainable development, marked by a firm embrace of green economy.

Indicting the significance of the protocol agreement in the development of relations between the Government of Eritrea and the African Development Bank, Dr. Abdul Kamara expressed commitment to continue cooperation in the important projects that the Government of Eritrea is initiating.

The Dekemhare Solar Photo Voltaic will be directly interlinked with that of Hirgigo Electricity Power Plant and aligned with the other initiatives will have a significant contribution in alleviating energy challenges in the country.

ENTERTAINMENT PROGRAM TO MEMBERS OF DEFENSE FORCES

WORKSHOP ON WASTE MANAGEMENT



The Ministry of Land, Water and Environment convened a workshop on 22 March at the National Confederation of Eritrean Workers Hall at Central region level focusing on industrial and other toxic waste management.

At the workshop in which the Governor of the Central region, representatives of various Ministries, administrators of subzones, members of Assembly, national associations and other invited guests took part, Mr. Tesfai Gebreselasie, Minister of Land, Water and Environment, stressed the environmental and human health detriment due to lack of proper waste management, and underlined need for putting the waste through recycling for the

benefit of the public.

Minister Tesfai also underscored the importance of strengthening institutions to oversee and control chemicals that enter the country legally or illegally before they cause damage on the health of the public.

At the workshop extensive briefings were provided focusing on management of industrial waste, waste and transportation and communication, waste mining and energy, medical waste, waste at educational facilities, challenges and consequences of water pollution, current waste management in Asmara, as well as the new guideline on waste management.

OBSERVANCE OF WORLD TB DAY 2023

World TB Day 2023, was observed at a national level in Asmara under the theme "Yes, We Can End TB in Our Lifetime" featuring various programs.

The program included students' march from Bahti Meskerem Square to Orotta Hospital carrying several placards and chanting slogans depicting the day, as well as general knowledge competitions and artistic performances.

Speaking at the occasion, Dr. Araya Berhane, director of Communicable Diseases Control at the Ministry of Health, indicated that tangible development has been registered in declining new infections and deaths due to TB, said that the disease is preventable if properly managed.

Dr. Asefash Tsehaye, a representative of World Health Organization (WHO) on her part said that between 2015 and 2021 the death rate due to TB has declined by 26% in Africa, and that with proper guidelines and intervention, the desired goal could be achieved.

At the occasion, awards have been handed over to winners of the general knowledge competitions.

World TB Day is being observed for the 41st time at international level and for the 25th time at national level.

SMCP: Giving Financial Support to the Poor and Small Business Start-Ups

There is a strong belief that Micro-Credit Savings and Programs (SMCP) have significant contribution individuals and small and medium start-ups and support economies at large. The goal of the Savings and Microcredit Program in Eritrea is to provide citizens living in rural, suburban, and urban areas with easy access to financial loans. It also gives employees in the public and private sector access to loans that are paid back by deducting a certain percentage of their monthly salary over an extended period of time and caters to retirees who would like to be productive citizens.

Today, SMCP has 777 rural banks in 23 branches that serve 73,542 customers. According to Mr Tadele, in 2022, the amount of loans taken by groups is the largest, which is 42.2 percent, while 40.1 percent of the loans were taken by employees and the remaining 17.8 by individuals. And the number of women customers was slightly more (52.5 percent) than that of men.

In terms of SMCP's distribution of loans at a regional level, the Central region takes the lead, with 24.3 percent, and is followed by Gash Barka region, with 17.8 percent, Anseba region, with 17.7 percent, Gash Barka region, with 13.6 percent, Southern region, with 13.4 percent, and Northern Red Sea region, with 13.2 percent.

In her presentation at the

Mrs Letekidan meeting, Ogubaslassie, head of the SMCP, outlined the branch's overall tasks, its human resource capacity, and the functions of the units reporting to her. She stated in her report on the documentation process that from 2014 to 2022, the receipt and payment documents taken and returned by the regions from the central office store were thoroughly examined and disposed of. She added that regional requests to verify clients' documents have been met, and some cases involving customers who did not pay their debts between 2007 and 2012 have been investigated.

The assessment meeting ended by proposing a work plan for 2023. The proposed plan includes intensifying monitoring and supervision in the regions, putting emphasis on non-serviced loans, establishing branches to promote loans for employees, rearranging jobs to increase employees' efficiency and intensifying campaigns to increase public and stakeholder awareness about funding practices.

The SMCP was founded in July 1996 and currently has 311 employees. It was run by the Ministry of Local Government for the first five years as part of the Eritrean Community Development Fund (ECDF), and since 2002 it has been operating under the auspices of the Ministry of Finance and National Development.





conducted an assessment of its activities in Asmara under the theme "no citizen will be deprived of productivity due to lack of financial access." In his presentation at the meeting, Mr. Tadele Tekeste, head of Operations Department at the SMCP, reiterated SMCP's vision, mission, and values and elaborated on group and individual loans, the two types of loans SMCP gives.

Typical members of group loans have low income and no prior work experience and are not required to have collateral. Individual loans, on the other hand, are available to customers who have been members in group loans and to new customers who meet the loan requirements and have a start-up or skills they can use to generate income. The

Up until the end of 2005, SMCP's policy did not allow employees in both the public and private sectors to borrow. However, the policy was revised in early 2006 and a new loan program was introduced, allowing employees to borrow a maximum of 40,000 Nakfa. Customers' debts are settled within one or two years by deducting the required amount from their monthly salary.

Before taking out a loan from the SMCP, customers are required to deposit 10% of the total amount of their approved loan. And in an event they wish to cancel their membership, the deposit is returned to them with interest as per the guidelines of the Bank of Eritrea.

SMCP's interest rates for customers vary. Customers in remote areas may pay up to 16% to cover the cost incurred by SMCP due to the distance. Employees in the public and private sectors, on the other hand, pay a flat interest rate of 7% per year on their loan. One per cent of this is paid as insurance in the event of death of a customer. This, of course, applies only to customers who

the years. Eleven rural banks were established in 2022, bringing the total number of banks to 762, the number of borrowers to 70,696, and the amount of money borrowed to 295.7 million Nakfa.

The fund's operational structure is available across the country. It is divided into 67 sub-zones and 628 local administrative areas.


The 1hr 41m film I watched on the second day of the fest pretty much proved to me that films are the most influential and educational works



March: Important Dates in the History of Eritrea

Our memory of history matters because the past is not bygone. Historical memory has an important role in nation building in Eritrea. The preservation of memory is a very essential condition for strengthening unity and national identity. Remembering important historical events is useful for the development of historical awareness. Historical awareness includes having sufficient knowledge of historical facts and their relationships, and this helps us to wisely face situations at present and in the future. Here, I will selectively recount important historical events that happened in the month of March in the history of Eritrea.

March 15, 1964, the Battle of Togorba: Eritrean freedom fighters ambushed the Ethiopian army and fought with great bravery for hours in Togorba, near Sawa training center. This battle is the first major combat between the very few Eritrean freedom fighters and Ethiopian colonial army. The battle of Togorba had far-reaching military and political significance.

March 9, 1975, Black Sunday: in Akordet. Successive Ethiopian governments intensified genocidal activities to crush the armed resistance of the Eritrean people and pursued a scorched earth technique of destruction and terror to impair the fighting spirit of Eritreans. Black Sunday at Akordet was part of the many barbaric and brutal killings of innocent Eritreans. On that cursed day people were drugged from their houses and the mosque like animals to be slain. Soldiers tore pregnant mothers' wombs, the heads of children and the elderly were separated from the rest of the body. The aim of the mass killings in Akordet and other places was to terrorize and


demoralize the people.

In his book 'the Red Tears,' Dawit Woldegiorgis, an Ethiopian colonial officer in Eritrea, acknowledged the brutality committed by the Ethiopian army. He wrote, "The army made a crucial error in this operation; it did not concentrate on attacking the guerrillas directly; instead it devastated the villages suspected of harboring them." Recounting his personal memory, he continued, "I remember soldiers slaughtering cattle, eating what they wanted, and then leaving the rest to rot. Sometimes soldiers would kill cattle just to get the livers."

The immediate cause of the March 9, 1975 massacre was the assassination of a security officer in Akordet by freedom fighters. When Major General Werku Chernet came to see the Ethiopian army in Barka, he held a meeting in Akordet. In the midst of the meeting he learned



continue the strategy of 'liberating the land and the people step by step.' Karora was the first town to be liberated, and that was in January 1977. Nakfa, the second town to be liberated, was liberated in March 1977 following a six-month siege. Nakfa is a symbol of resilience and perseverance. The Ethiopian army made so many attempts to recapture



1978 up to 1983, the Ethiopian

army had a relatively superior

position over the freedom fighters.

March 17-19, 1988, the Demise of Nadew Command and the Liberation of Afabet: After the second and unity congress, the EPLF had decided to intensify its

fighters. Afabet, which since 1979 had been the center of Ethiopia's strongest army, fell in the hands of the EPLF on March 19. The center of gravity of the Ethiopian army was smashed and the Derg lost 18,000 soldiers, members of one of its most experienced and war hardened army. Lt. Col. Afewerki Wassae, political commissar of the Ethiopian army in Eritrea, and three officers from the Soviet Union were captured by EPLF fighters. At this operation, 50 tanks, 100 trucks and a large number of light and heavy weapons were seized.

The battle of Afabet has been described by the historian, Basil Davidson, as "one of the biggest victories ever scored by a liberation movement anywhere since Dien Bien Phu."

March 12 – 19, 1987: the Second and Unity Congress of the Eritrean People's Liberation Front and the Eritrean Liberation Front (Central Leadership): The Congress was attended by 1,287 representatives of freedom fighters (tegadelti) and civilians, nationalist organizations, representatives of 25 governments, parties and organizations. Veteran nationalist leaders Woldeab Woldemariam, in person, and Sheik Ibrahim Sultan, via video, delivered messages of unity and heroism to the participants. Issaias Afwerki was elected Secretary General of the EPLF.

March 14-16, 1999, Crushing Intensive Offensive of TPLF Units



about the assassination of the well-known Ethiopian agent in the town. Before leaving the town, he gave his subordinates an order to kill the inhabitants of the town. The atrocious massacre began at around 4:15 pm and continued well up to 7:00 in the evening. Within three hours, more than 375 innocent people were killed and more than 350 houses burned. Eritreans have named that day 'Black Sunday.'

March 23, 1977, the Liberation of Nakfa: At its first organization's congress, the EPLF had resolved to

Nakfa but was defeated by the gallant Eritrean fighters. Nakfa saved the symbolic and material aspect of the Eritrean struggle for independence. In recognition of its paramount importance during the struggle for independence, Eritrea's national currency has been named Nakfa.


March 26, 1983, the Seventh or Stealth Offensive of the Derg. This offensive was different from the previous campaigns because it was conducted without fanfare. It lasted five months until the EPLF fighters took the initiative to conduct a counter offensive attack. The Derg launched the military attack based on the assumption that the EPLF had been weakened by the end of the Derg's sixth offensive. At the end of the day, the Derg army was defeated and lost around 25,000 members of its army, both dead and wounded.

March 19-21, 1984, the Demise of Wuqaw Command in North Eastern Sahel: Following the EPLF's strategic withdrawal in



military operations to facilitate the burial of the Derg. On March 17 the EPLF began its most comprehensive military offensive to put annihilate Nadew Command and liberate Afabet. The Nadew Command was a 22,000 strong army, stationed permanently at Nakfa and Afabet fronts for nine years. As planned, EPLF fighters destroyed the Nadew Command and liberated Afabet within 48 hours. The strongest of the Ethiopian army couldn't withstand the offensive of EPLF

at Egrimekel: On 14th March 1999 the TPLF-led government of Ethiopia started an attack to break the defense lines of Eritrean Defense Forces at Egrimekel using human waves of 10 units and 100 tanks. The battle of Egrimekel fighting demonstrated the capabilities and perseverance of Eritrean forces. TPLF units were destroyed, 30 tanks were captured and another 55 were burned while one MI-35 helicopter was shot down by Eritrean forces.

How did the idea of translating come?
