



June to September 2024 Seasonal Forecast: Above-normal Rainfall and Higher-than-normal temperatures are predicted over most parts of the Greater Horn of Africa

21st May 2024, Juba, South Sudan: The IGAD Climate Prediction and Applications Centre (ICPAC) issued the June to September 2024 seasonal forecast indicating an increased likelihood of above-normal rainfall over most parts of the Greater Horn of Africa (GHA). The areas expected to experience these above-normal conditions include Djibouti, Eritrea, central and northern Ethiopia, western and coastal Kenya, much of Uganda, South Sudan, and Sudan. On the other hand, parts of northern Somalia, isolated areas over western Ethiopia, and north-western South Sudan are expected to experience drierthan-normal conditions. The climate patterns in the JJAS 2024 period closely resemble those of 1998 and 2010, both of which experienced wetter-than-normal conditions over much of the region.

An early to normal onset is expected in several parts of the region including central and northern Ethiopia, Eritrea, Sudan, and South Sudan. However, a delayed onset is likely in Djibouti, parts of eastern and western Ethiopia, central and western Sudan, and southern South Sudan.

The temperature forecast shows a probability of warmer-thannormal conditions across the region, particularly over northern

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Layout Azmera Berhane Sudan, central and western Ethiopia, Somalia, Kenya, Rwanda, Burundi, and Tanzania.

Dr. Guleid Artan, ICPAC's Director noted that "The Greater Horn of Africa (GHA) stands as a region that is highly susceptible to the adverse impacts of climate change, which pose significant challenges to the resilience of our communities. The forecasted wetter-than-normal conditions for June to September 2024 echo the patterns of 1998 and 2010, highlighting the level of impact especially for South Sudan and Sudan, which may experience impacts of floods."

"As we observe these recurring extreme climate events, it is important to acknowledge the pivotal role played by early warning systems which serve as key instruments of preparedness, guiding us through climate variability. Through our operations, ICPAC continues to provide actionable climate information that is relevant and key for Early Action," he added.

In line with the World



Meteorological Organization's guidelines and recommendations, ICPAC has adopted an objective seasonal forecast method to generate climate forecasts for the Greater Horn of Africa. May 2024 initialized seasonal forecasts from 9 Global Producing Centres (GPCs) were utilised and processed to develop the June - September 2024 seasonal climate outlook. The seasonal forecasts and their hindcast

data were analysed to provide a probabilistic forecast indicating the likelihood of above-normal, normal, or below-normal rainfall.



A Letter From Asmerci

In the realm of competing global narratives, some stories remain obscured, hidden beneath layers of misconception and misrepresentation. Among these tales lies the enigma of Eritrea, a nation whose reality often varies dramatically from the perceptions peddled by mainstream Western legacy media. As a Somali journalist, my recent one week trip to Eritrea unveiled to me a world of simple sophistication, resilience, and captivating allure, challenging the boring repetitive narratives and leaving me mesmerized beyond measure.

Tucked in the Horn of Africa, Eritrea stands as a testament

than 22 years old, she effortlessly conversed in four languages, seamlessly transitioning between Tigrinya, Arabic, English, and Italian. Her command over each tongue was not merely a display of linguistic aptitude but a testament to the country's commitment to education and infusion of worldliness to its young population. I wouldn't have known what languages she spoke had she not spoken to me in Tigrinya to which she saw through my initial perplexity. I resorted to my favorite line whenever ethnical ambiguity engulfs my person — "I am Somali." After establishing that, she quipped "Are you the only

among so many people in the streets. I later learned that normally the work day starts early in this part of the world and there is a national cycling culture with bicycles galore. With an intriguing and illustrious cycling heritage, Eritrea has produced many cyclists who dominate on big international racing platforms. Cyclists from Eritrea have participated in and won significant victories from both regional and international cycling races. As a result, Eritrea is widely regarded as Africa's cycling superpower.

It was outside the confines of my hotel room that I continued to truly witness the essence of Eritrea's societal fabric. Each morning, as the sun rose up, I observed groups of young schoolchildren embarking on their daily journey to education. Clad in neatly worn red shirts with black necks and sleeves, black trousers and black boot uniforms they navigated the city's streets on bicycles, sometimes 2 students on a single bicycle on the dedicated bicycle lane along the city's main roads. The sight of these young cyclists traversing the streets of Asmara stood in stark contrast to the narratives often propagated about Eritrea. Far from being a nation of gloom, here was a land brimming with youthful energy and optimism.

Walking around the marketplaces of Asmara, Eritrea with visiting acquaintances was an enriching experience filled with vibrant colours, diverse aromas, and an overwhelming palpable sense of community. The markets boast a large assortment of fresh, locally sourced produce that reflects the rich agricultural strength of the region. From plump tomatoes and crisp greens to sweet fruits and aromatic spices, the bounty of Eritrean soil is on full display. With its farms feeding its population, food sovereignty is a leaf to be borrowed from this wonderful place.

Walk out of the stalls of produce and you will encounter an ingenious local industry which caters to the varied daily needs of Eritrean society. Skilled artisans craft everything from intricately shared experiences & common

to the triumph of sovereignty beyond flag independence in the African continent. Stepping onto its soil, starting at Asmara International Airport, I was immediately struck by the pristine elegance of Asmara, its capital city. The streets, adorned with meticulously manicured lawns, palm trees and with unique colonial-era architecture which was evidently well preserved, the city exuded an air of timeless grace. This was a city that seemed to exist in a realm untouched by the chaos often associated with African capitals; poor urban planning, unmitigated traffic chaos that greets new and old visitors alike.

My sojourn began at Asmara Palace Hotel, where I encountered a young Eritrean lady whose sharp intellect and linguistic prowess left an unforgettable impression on me. At not more

one that looks like us or do all Somalis look like us Eritreans?" without much thought I jokingly replied "No, I think it is you guys who look like us, I was wondering the same thing." She proceeded to tell me tales of how the older generation are fond of how much Somalia and the Somali people lent a helping hand to Eritrea in its long history of the struggle for independence. As one of the first encounters in the country, I was pleased with the young lady's social grace, mannerisms and enjoyed every bit of the small talk which resulted in my finding out she was indeed a competent polyglot!

After a well-deserved rest, I woke up early next day and decided to venture out onto the street at 5:25AM thinking it would be ideal to stroll around before the city woke up, I was surprised to find that I was

A striking aspect of the marketplace is the presence of a well-equipped workforce comprising of competently educated, trained, and talented youth who are equally balanced between males and females, in this country you will find a high degree of equitable distribution of both genders in almost every sector of society — a feat achieved by not many societies in the world let alone in the African continent. These young individuals, armed with knowledge and skills acquired through a well catered education and vocational training programs, contribute significantly the local economy. Whether managing businesses, providing services, or innovating new products, the youth of Asmara exemplify the promise of Eritrea's future which has been well taken of in my estimation.

In Eritrea, I found something that I did think I had, a longing for my country to attain the same levels of decisiveness.

To my fellow Africans, I extend an appeal — a call to venture beyond the confines of familiarity and explore the wonders of this remarkable nation. Come, witness firsthand what genuine independence and sovereignty feel like. To African journalists, here lies a story that needs to be told — a story of a nation that should be aimed to be replicated across the continent.

Afabet Subzone: A Model for Development in Education

Like other subzones, Afabet, the most populated subzone in the Northern Red Sea region, has social services such as education, healthcare, transport, electricity and communication. Education, in particular, stands out as a well-established social service in the subzone.

Prior to Eritrea's independence there were only three elementary schools in the entire subzone. Today, there are 23 preschools and 32 elementary, 16 juniorsecondary, and 3 secondary schools. This phenomenal growth from 3 to 74 schools has been made possible by the government's policy of making education accessible to ensure that no one is left behind. The policy puts emphasis on giving equal opportunity to all citizens, especially those who had been disadvantaged. The three high schools, for instance, are strategically located in Afabet town, Qelamet, and Naro to make them accessible to students all over the subzone.

The government's dedication to wiping out illiteracy also shines most brightly in Afabet subzone. In addition to regular schooling for young students, the subzone offers an adult education program. The adult education program is three-pronged: a literacy program and a post-literacy program for adults and a special program targeting the youth.

The literacy and post-literacy programs equip adults with basic reading, writing, and numeracy skills, and they serve as a foundation for further learning, empowering individuals to participate more actively in their communities. And the special program for the youth provides a second chance at education for those who have missed out on the opportunity to go to school in their childhood. It allows them to catch up with their peers and pursue further education or employment opportunities. By investing in education, the government isn't just teaching people to read and write but also unlock a world of opportunities for the participants.

Adult education program is delivered across 27 conveniently

located centers throughout the subzone, ensuring access for all members of the communities. The impressive number of participants speaks volumes about the programs' success. Over 6,000 students are actively engaged in adult education, complementing the 15,970 students enrolled in regular academic programs. The quality of education is reflected in the promotion rates of participants in national exams. Specifically, the number of students who pass in the eighth-grade national exam and the secondary school leaving certificate exam has grown significantly. The eighth-grade national exam is administered to determine who goes to secondary school while the secondary school leaving certificate exam serves as college entrance exam.

Another remarkable achievement lies in women's empowerment. Since 2012, over 95% of the women who attended adult education programs from 2012 to 2024 have joined regular schools and graduated from high school. Many of these women are now working at various offices across the subzone.

Immediately following Eritrea's independence, the primary goal was to rapidly extend access to education for all. Schools were immediately constructed using readily available resources to satisfy the pressing need. However, shortly thereafter, the emphasis shifted away from having makeshift



schools and simple structures to building schools with comfortable learning environment for kids.

Education is free in Eritrea and this ensures the provision of equal opportunity for every child. To make them accessible, schools have been built in all the 16 administrative areas of Afabet subzone. The government, in collaboration with local communities, is actively working to improve and upgrade these schools. Over time, the makeshift facilities have been transformed into permanent structures with proper infrastructure. The schools are now nurturing a generation of well-educated citizens. Many graduate from high school and some go to college and serve the nation in diverse capacities after they graduate from college.

One of the key challenges in education at Afabet subzone has to do with the scattered nature of villages and settlements in certain areas. This is particularly true in places such as Marsa Gulbub administrative area, where the majority of the people are nomads. This obviously makes it difficult to set up schools in permanent locations as the communities move around. However, the Ministry of Education is dealing with the challenge by operating schools that run their programs seasonally that is suitable to the communities' way of living.

There is no question that the government has made significant strides in expanding educational services across Afabet subzone, but the community's engagement should be maintained if the

initiatives are to succeed. It is very important for the communities to appreciate the critical role education plays in shaping a nation's future. The role of parents, in particular, is crucial for the success of the education programs. Parents play a vital role by enrolling their children in schools.

Afabet subzone borders Nakfa subzone to the west, the Red Sea to the east, Qrora to the north, Geleb to the southeast, Habero to the west and Shieb to the southeast. It has the largest population in the Northern Red Sea region and ranks among the most populous subzones in the country. Over 120,000 people live in the subzone that has 16 administrative areas. The thriving population adds to the subzone's vitality and cultural diversity.

- Liaise with external technical support providers, following up on user problems until resolution is achieved.

Level 1 provides support for received calls from users and solve technical issues if technically able to do so, coordinating responses to/from 2nd level teams and generally managing the users' requests for support in all areas of IT. Level 2 support builds on Level 1 activities and provides support for incidents or service requests of moderate complexity such as: recommending acquisition of hardware, software, devices, tools; complex software and hardware troubleshooting; maintaining inventories; desktop and laptop deployment and configuration; simple user account administration; website development and updates; configuration and testing of hardware and software; assistance in testing and evaluation of new products and technologies; information systems monitoring and support; and, maintaining information systems such as databases.

- Maintain an inventory of computers, peripherals, software, and MISTS equipment; Monitor the Office's Minimum Security Telecommunications Standards and MISTS equipment; ensure its appropriate maintenance, secure handling and storage, and track loaned equipment.

Information Resources and Records **Management:**

Act as focal point on all matters pertaining to the information resources, library and records management and liaise with the Office for Corporate Communication at Headquarters as required.

- Process incoming and outgoing correspondence and documentation both electronic and paper based: send, receive, analyze, classify, route, distribute and file correspondence; check the quality of the processes and ensure that all formal requirements are met in compliance with standard procedures.
- Assess and execute the transfer of semi-active records to central archives according to agreed retention schedules and procedures.
- Perform other duties as required.

Impact of work

The incumbent's work impacts on the timely and efficient delivery of IT and/or information resources and records management support services. Actions reflect on the transparency and accountability of the work unit and on the effectiveness and efficiency of programme delivery.


First and foremost, it's an opportunity for them to learn about and grow fond of where they come from and where they should be heading. Any misinformation that
